

## FROM BROOKWOOD TO THIEPVAL

**The National Commemorative Event to mark the Centenary of The Battle of the Somme – a personal account by John Wheeler**

Last year Fiona and I were fortunate to be selected in the ballot for tickets for the National Commemorative Event held on 1 July 2016 at the Commonwealth War Graves Commission's Thiepval Memorial to the Missing of the Somme.

Our family history research had revealed a personal link with Thiepval: Fiona's great-uncle, Stanley Townsend, died on 6 September 1916 in

## WILL'S GREAT FEAT!

*People in Brookwood have lots of interests and hobbies. Will Weir, who lives in Connaught Road, has spent much of his free time during the last 30 years climbing Munros in Scotland. There are 284 of them. Last month Will invited 40 friends and family, including some from Brookwood, to celebrate with him as he climbed his last Munro, Gael Chan, near Blair Atholl. I am grateful that he is willing to share his passion with the newsletter.*

**Q. So tell me what is a Munro?**

The name Munro comes from Sir Hugh Munro who, in 1891, drew up a list of separate Scottish mountains over 3000 feet in height in the journal of the Scottish Mountaineering Club (SMC). Although Munro never completed the list and never climbed all the mountains, the SMC has maintained the list according to that original criterion of height (914.4m these days) and they have come to be known as the Munros.

**Q. How did you get into climbing them?**

When I was a child family holidays were often in the Scottish Highlands and I came to love the country, although we didn't climb hills and I knew nothing of Munros. At school in Lincoln, I often went with friends to the Peak District; then, at university, I found my way into the university rambling club and friends there introduced me, first, to the Lake District hills and to rock climbing and then to the Scottish hills. Even then, it was a few years before I became aware of the Munros. But once we found them it became inevitable that we would climb them all!

**Q. Why climb 280+ mountains in Scotland?**

Can I paraphrase Mallory's answer? Because they are there. There are many reasons why

the battle for the nearby village of Guillemont. He was 20 and his name is recorded among the 72,000 names on the Thiepval Memorial.

During the intervening months it dawned on us just what a highly organised operation this would be – 10,000 attending, a security exclusion zone around the town of Albert, scheduled times to arrive at Albert airport (to be strictly observed), dietary requirements for the picnic lunch, and much, much more.

Any thoughts that we would be sitting in warm sunshine had long been dispelled by weather forecasts before we arrived, and there were frequent, heavy showers during our short stay. In fact, these were very similar conditions to those a hundred years before, when the start of the attack had been delayed due to the weather. Rain ponchos were dispensed by the organisers – not a luxury the troops enjoyed all those years ago.

The service was attended by members of our Royal Family, the French and Irish Presidents, David Cameron and other members of the Great and the Good. It was quite truthfully the most moving event that either of us have ever experienced: an 87 year-old reading the words

that his father, awarded the VC for his bravery within sight of the Memorial, had written about his experience; serving members of the Armed Forces reading the words and telling the stories of their predecessors; poetry written by Isaac Rosenberg who served on the Somme and died later in the war; the most wonderful rendition of 'Keep the Home Fires Burning' by the Morriston Orpheus Choir and the Band of the Welsh Guards; and, finally, the Silence.

Except that it was not total silence – the most enchanting birdsong could be heard loud and clear as the poppy and cornflower petals fluttered down from the top of the Memorial – a sound, perhaps, that the troops might also have heard so long ago, just before all that horror was unleashed.



good navigational skills, even with modern technologies, proper footwear and clothing, and an awareness of how quickly the weather can change and how harsh it can be even in summer. The Lake District is a good place to start.

**Q. What was your worst moment?**

Maybe finishing the Cuillin Ridge on Skye after two days of hard scrambling and rock climbing and walking out to Sligachan, only to find that we'd missed last orders in the hotel; or perhaps spraining an ankle when on a solo backpacking trip in remote country and having to walking 20km to my car before the swelling immobilised me.

**Q. And your best?**

There have been so many. For example, starting a winter traverse of Ben Nevis and a neighbouring summit in thick mist and breaking through the cloud to see snow-covered peaks peeping through the clouds for miles around, or descending a ridge in summer with an eagle soaring a few yards to my left. The last one a couple of weeks ago was very special, too.



people climb the Munros but for me it's been a wonderful way to get to know the Highlands, with almost every walk providing a new experience; seeing wildlife I've not seen before or some new aspect of the weather (there's plenty of weather) or just the sheer beauty of the country. Probably most of all, though, I've forged friendships which will last my whole life.

**Q. Can anyone do it?**

With a certain amount of fitness and preparation, anyone can climb a Munro. On my last Munro, the youngest at the summit was 11 and the oldest was 76. Whether anyone can climb all the Munros is a slightly different question. The easiest Munro involves a walk of around 3km round trip and an ascent of around 200m whilst the toughest involves a walk over very rugged terrain followed by a rock climb to get to the summit, and there are many levels in between. However, for safety, they all require

## BROOKWOOD SWIFT FLEDGLING

There is still one family of swifts nesting in Brookwood each year. This year one of their fledglings left the nest a little too soon. It was found huddled on the gravel beside our drive. You should not normally touch fallen fledglings because their parents will usually recover them, but swifts never land and are unable to take off from the ground, so something had to be done. After consulting with the Swift Conservancy ([www.swift-conservation.org](http://www.swift-conservation.org)), the fledgling was held aloft on a flat palm and given the chance to fly, but it wouldn't. The swift website directed us to the Wildlife Aid Foundation ([www.wildlifeaid.org.uk](http://www.wildlifeaid.org.uk)) and the young swift



was placed in a shoe-box (with holes) and taken to their hospital in Leatherhead. They have a lady who specialises in the care of swifts so the prognosis looks good. Once it is able to fly, she may even try to release it near its home in Brookwood so it can re-join its family and maintain our local population.
