## IS IT A BIRD? IS IT A PLANE? NO, IT'S WOKING'S EVERYDAY RECYCLING HEROES!





## **BROOKWOOD PRIMARY SCHOOL SHARING OUR RESULTS AND SUCCESSES**

The latest from school is that the hard work of our pupils and their teachers has created some headline news on pupil results and successes.

Over the past year we have radically updated how we educate the very youngest in school. Using the most recent academic research on what makes the biggest impact on learning, we have transformed our teaching. Last year, across England, 52% of children in reception classes achieved a 'Good Level of Development'. This year, 73% of Brookwood children did!

For various reasons, a significant number of Brookwood children arrive in our school below nationally expected levels in reading, writing, number, and in terms of their social and emotional maturity. We work hard to help them catch up throughout their first three years with us. So much so that, by the end of the Infants, this year our pupils well exceeded last year's national levels in reading, writing and maths. In fact, they were, on average, towards a term ahead in reading and writing.

As far as the Juniors go, we have been working very hard to make sure that our Year 6 leavers have achieved a good rate of progress from whatever their starting point was in Year 3. This year, pupils have matched the 'expected' rate of progress in all subjects, and reached 'accelerated' progress in reading and exceeded (by miles) 'accelerated' progress in writing.

Individually, pupils met (and often exceeded) their own ambitious targets. Two pupils achieved the national 'gold standard' of Level 6 in maths and one a Level 6 in writing. Having said this, we are just as proud of the other results pupils achieved which, for each of them, represented their personal gold standard.

On a different note, three teachers left school at the end of the summer term. Mrs Alison Good (nee Beale) has taken a post as Deputy Headteacher

and part-time Acting Headteacher at a school in Farnborough. Miss Anna Readman has changed schools to a growing primary school near Guildford where she can use her leadership skills to great effect, and Mr Adam White has left to explore new opportunities. Mrs Chris Hunt left school in July for a career change; she will be supporting much older children who have left secondary school into work or further education or training. We wish all of them success in their ongoing ventures.

There are a number of community events scheduled for the Autumn Term. Keep an eye on the notice board for further events and dates – including a Quiz Night, Bingo Night and, of course, the Christmas Fair.

We would love to see any of you who have not yet visited our lovely school – or anyone who's not been in for a while. The welcome will always be warm!

Bridleways and routes between Sheets Heath, Brookwood and Stafford Lake, Knaphill, restored by the Worplesdon and District Bridleways Association (WDBA), will be getting a further facelift in October with help from the Phoenix Explorer Scouts from the Runnymede District Scout Group. They will be rolling up their sleeves and getting their hands dirty alongside WDBA members.

If you would like to join us please come along between 10am and 4pm on Sunday 5th October. Around ten Scouts will join WDBA members in clearing drainage ditches which were created when the bridleways and routes were restored. The Scouts will also clear vegetation from along the stream and surrounding areas. The work they do is vital in order to keep the routes open to all users. This area floods easily and, by clearing the ditches/stream and removing surrounding vegetation, the flow of water will be maintained and flooding prevented.
