STEAM TRAINS THROUGH BROOKWOOD

On average we have a steam special through Brookwood and return about once a week in the summer time, rather less in the winter. During peak summer the 'Dorset Coast Express' runs weekly on Wednesdays, London to Weymouth and return. On return journeys to London, the specials are sometimes scheduled to stop in the platform at Brookwood for the loco to take water for about 10 minutes. Typical time for this is about 8pm (between local trains!). Other likely destinations are Salisbury, Exeter, Bath and Bristol.

The trains are run by charter companies, who pay Network Rail for access to the line. The two main companies for our area



are 'The Railway Touring Company' and 'Steam Dreams'. Both have websites and all passenger bookings must be made in advance. Both the locos and coaches are 'vintage' of course.

FORUM

QUESTIONNAIRE GETS GOOD RESPONSE

The response to the recent questionnaire sent out across the village by the Brookwood and Bridley Neighbourhood Forum (BBNF) has been encouraging. Around 1600 questionnaires were distributed by the Woking District Jamboree Scouts to all properties in the Neighbourhood Area and, as at midday on 30 November, 416 had been received back. This represents a return of just over 25%.

A prize draw was held in Brookwood Club at midday on 30 November and the following questionnaires were randomly selected:

- A. Salter (£50 M&S voucher)
- N. M. Stephens (£25 M&S voucher)
- L. Rivet (£10 M&S voucher)

As part of this exercise, the BBNF has seen membership swell by an excess of 90 people, bringing the total membership to over 275. This membership is drawn from across the Neighbourhood Area and from across all age ranges.

The chairman of the Forum, Kevin Davis, commented: 'An incredible response, with a wide range of views and ideas for how this small community can move forward. Everyone has had a chance to have a say, and now the hard work will begin as we thoroughly analyse all questionnaires and start to understand how people would like the area shaped.'

A more detailed questionnaire will be prepared for release in the spring of 2015, which will allow the Forum to define policies relevant to the wishes of the people. This will enable a draft plan to be created which, after consultation, will likely go to a referendum in May 2016.

WOKING COUNCIL BUYS BROOKWOOD CEMETERY

On 12 December Woking Borough Council announced that it has secured the ownership of Brookwood Cemetery by purchasing the shares in the companies which owned the Cemetery – Brookwood Park Limited and Brookwood Cemetery Limited.



The Council agreed at a Special Council Meeting on 24 November 2014 that it should secure the Cemetery, by establishing Woking Necropolis and Mausoleum Limited as a subsidiary within its Thamesway Group of companies. The commercial terms of this purchase remain confidential.

Leader of the Council, Cllr John Kingsbury, said: 'The Council considers Brookwood Cemetery to be a vitally important part of Woking's heritage and its future. Since the end of the First World War, Brookwood Cemetery has declined in quality due to lack of investment. As the Council, we faced a major challenge: to stand by and see it decline further, despite the best efforts of the current operators, or to intervene. We decided we owed it to future generations to intervene now, despite the challenges ahead.'

'We appreciate that we cannot provide a quick fix for nearly 100 years of decline, but we will work with other agencies to steadily restore the Cemetery and make it once again a high-quality place for burial. Over the next two years we will develop detailed plans for Brookwood Cemetery with a view to implementing a series of improvements by 2020 that will make the Borough proud of this important site.'

These changes do not affect the military cemeteries.

Our local councillor, Kevin Davis, said: 'The purchase of the Cemetery is excellent news for Brookwood. In the recent Forum questionnaire it was frequently mentioned as a place valued by residents for recreation. WBC has a long-term plan (> 25 years) to restore the Cemetery to its former glory. This is in stark contrast to the usual accusations that politicians only consider the short term.'

Brookwood Cemetery is the most important cultural site in Woking and is listed in the top ten of heritage sites most at risk in England.

I hope the Forum will be able to bring forward policies that assist WBC in preserving and enhancing the Cemetery for generations to come.'

Did you know? Brookwood is the largest cemetery in the country, nearly a quarter of a million people are buried there and at one time 3500 burials took place every year.

BURGLARY PREVENTION

Mark Saunders, Surrey Police Crime Reduction Advisor, reports a spate of burglaries in the Woking area in early December, including one in Brookwood.

It is believed that all of these offences occurred at unoccupied properties during the hours of dusk. In the majority of these burglaries entry was gained by accessing the rear gardens then forcing through a door or window.

You can make a huge difference and dramatically reduce the chances of being burgled by taking just a few simple measures:

- Always lock doors and windows before leaving your home.
- Set your burglar alarm whenever you leave your home. If you don't have one, get one.
- Make your home looks occupied when nobody is home by using an automatic light timer or by leaving lights on.
- Never leave door or car keys, wallets or handbags within reach of a letterbox, door or window.
- Don't keep large amounts of money or jewellery at home. If you have to keep it at home, use a safe that is stored out of sight.
- Going away? Cancel milk, newspaper and other regular deliveries, and ask a friend or trusted neighbour to keep an eye on your home.
- Register your property on a free national property registration database. Visit www.immobilise.com.
- Always secure your shed and garage, and don't leave ladders and other tools outside in order for a burglar to use.
- Report any suspicious behaviour in your area by calling 101. If you feel that a crime is in progress always call 999.

HAVE YOUR SAY ON LOCAL TRANSPORT IN SURREY

Do you travel by bus to work, school, medical appointments or local shops? Maybe you use community transport such as Dial-a-Ride to get around, or occasionally catch the bus to visit a friend or relative.

Surrey County Council is reviewing local transport and is asking residents to have their say about which services matter most to them. Whether you regularly travel by bus or rarely use local transport, this is your chance to help shape the future of these services in Surrey. All you need to do is complete the online questionnaire (www.surreycc.gov.uk/transportreview), pick up a paper questionnaire from libraries and local council offices across Surrey, or call 0300 200 1003 to request a copy.

The council currently spends around £8.9m a year subsidising public buses, one of the highest spends in South East England. Half of the 29m journeys made on Surrey buses each year are on services that the council subsidises, and per passenger the subsidies range from 13p to £10.64 per journey. The council also spends £640,000 every year on community transport and £8.7m on concessionary fares, including some extra discretionary concessions for disabled people and their carers.

As part of the review, the council will look at ways that vital savings can be made while maintaining the services residents rely on most, including securing better deals with commercial bus operators and encouraging travel on underused services. Feedback from residents will also play a key role, and no plans will be drawn up until residents and other stakeholders have had their say.
