LITTLE LOST CORNER OF BROOKWOOD

An unusual feature of Brookwood Cemetery was that it had its own private railway running through the grounds. The main reason for this was that the Cemetery was over 25 miles from central London, and the only convenient method of transporting coffins and mourners was by the London & South Western Railway. The funeral trains began to operate from 13 November 1854 when the Cemetery opened to the public.

The funeral trains ran from this private station, located at 121 Westminster Bridge Road, down the railway company's main line, and was then reversed into the Cemetery grounds at Brookwood. The trains ran once a day, assuming that funerals were booked to take place. The Sunday service ceased after October 1900. Thereafter the trains operated largely on an 'as required' basis. By the 1930s they were running twice a week at most. The service was never reinstated after the Second World War, and the track in the Cemetery was removed c1947-48. The track bed of the railway may still be followed through the grounds, and the Brookwood Cemetery Society organises guided walks following this route during the course of the year.

EDITORIAL



UPDATE FROM COUNCILLOR KEVIN DAVIS

The proposals for the Coblands and Five Acres site are moving slowly forward, with the planning application likely to be submitted in the next few weeks. I am advised that the application will essentially be in two parts. First, the regularisation of the traveller site with 19 permanent pitches, and one transit pitch, all managed on site from the bungalow. The traveller site will be immediately behind the bungalow. Second, on the rest of the Coblands site and beyond, bar the four properties on Bagshot Road, there will be 126 units. The vast bulk will be two-bedroom houses or apartments which are most in demand, and a good number of one-bedroom units, and finally a handful of three-bedroom, and I think three four-bedroom houses. There needs to be a mix of housing types I'm told.

Woking Borough Council's arm's length company, Thamesway, is the developer behind it and will then manage the affordable aspect of the properties. My view has been sought, and I'm told that the ratios are likely be 40% market value to sell (50 units), 40% affordable for rent (50 units) and 20% affordable for sale (26 units). The market value to sell will effectively pay for the crossroads improvements and subsidise the affordability of the rest. The intent with the affordable housing is for it to have a local-first policy, although this is a deviation from normal Council policy, so I am still lobbying the Housing Portfolio Holder (Cllr Kemp) and the Leader of the Council (Cllr Bittleston) to make sure this happens.

I've been working on this for several years, and I think this is great news for the village. The smaller houses will provide young people who may be living with parents somewhere to move to, and will allow older people somewhere to downsize to. It will likely also increase the number of children living in Brookwood, which is good for the longer-term viability of the school and will stop the average age of residents steadily increasing as it has been for a while now. As soon as the planning application goes in, I will update my blog (<https://cllrkevindavis.me>) and will ensure the plan number is in the next edition of Brookwood News.

The derelict Meadows NHS Trust site appears to have been purchased by a care home operator. Nothing further is known at this stage.

Many thanks to Cllr Kevin for his support of the village and all the hard work he puts in.

WHO ARE NOTTINGHAM KNOCKERS?

Please warn your neighbours, particularly elderly or vulnerable neighbours, not to open the door to strangers or buy or sell on the doorstep. Some doorstep callers may offer poor quality goods at inflated prices and, if a caller is not genuine, they may be gathering information for future crime. Please keep in mind that if cold callers don't get any sales in your area, they are less likely to return.

The sellers may say that they are on a 'rehabilitation course' arranged by probation services or other organisations trying to find people work. This is not the case and often they are known criminals. Probation services do not run such schemes.

They may show a card which claims to be a 'Pedlars Licence' or work permit. The following is an example of one that has been frequently seized by the Police. This is not valid and they are breaking the law if they are using anything like this. They may also hand over a card saying they are deaf or dumb.



According to the Police, the bag of household products is supplied by someone who employs them (originally a man from Nottingham – hence the name), but now they are recruited from anywhere. The lads are supplied with a full bag of household products (including the typical tea-towels!) and charged a minimal sum for the contents – it used to be £35. They can keep whatever they make, above this amount.

Usually they are deposited in an area from a transit van and given a list of streets to work. An hour or so later they are picked up and dropped off in another location. They often work from 9am to 9pm. They will knock on a door, offering cleaning items which they know are cheap and of very poor quality; the householder also knows they are rubbish but that is part of the scam. Many people will purchase items and pay them something, just to get rid of them. There have been cases of elderly residents handing over large sums as these lads can be very persistent and confrontational.

The price for whatever has been purchased usually comes to a note – usually £10. The householder disappears to get this – this is when the scam begins, according to the Police. When the note is handed over, the lad examines the condition and how long it took the person to get it. If it is crumpled, they accept it and move on. If it is crisp, flat and new, they are much more interested and may engage the person in more conversation, to obtain details about them. As they leave they will smell the note. If it is slightly musty, this is an indication that there is more in the property. Those addresses are noted. The addresses of elderly/vulnerable/gullible people are all noted.

These are handed to the employer and there is a small amount of cash handed over for each one. These addresses are then sold on. If there is a later break-in, the employer expects a further cut of the proceeds. These lists are purchased by all sorts of people including – tarmacers, tree workers, roofers, dodgy builders, etc., and can be shared quite easily. Once on a list, your address could be sold on and on. Hence the repeat nature of these persistent callers.

SCHOOL FAIR

This year's School Fair, held on 24 June, was another great success and the weather was kind to us. There was a good turnout from all the local organizations, from the WI (their cake stand sold out in record time) to the Scouts and the Army. The fair was well attended, and the burger stand and beer tent did a roaring trade.
