REMEMBRANCE SUNDAY

The Remembrance Service will take place in St Saviour's Church commencing at 10.30am. The first part of the service will focus on remembering those who lost their lives in the two world wars and subsequent wars, and wreaths will be laid. The second part of the service following the two minutes' silence will continue the theme of Remembrance and include Holy Communion. The service should conclude about 11.45am when refreshments will be served. Any organisation that wishes to lay a wreath can do so as there will be a time in the service before the Remembrance silence for wreaths to be brought to the altar, before the names of those who lived in the village and lost their lives are read out.

JOIN IN WITH THE COMMONWEALTH WAR GRAVES THIS NOVEMBER

In its centenary year, the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) has been looking ahead to its next 100 years and will be launching its new charity this month, as well as a global event on Remembrance Sunday.

On 7 November, the Commonwealth War Graves Foundation (CWGF) will be launched – the new CWGC charity created to keep the memory of fallen servicemen and women alive.

The Commission as a whole cares for the war graves and memorials of the 1.7 million servicemen and women who died during both world wars at 23,000 locations in 154 countries and territories. The creation of the Commission in 1917 marked a major turning point in the way service personnel were honoured after death. Now, 100 years on, the Foundation is taking action to empower young people to carry the legacy forward for another century.

The CWGF will take the work of the Commission to a much wider audience by offering hands-on opportunities to get involved in various projects – including the new internships. Education, outreach and events will help bridge the generational gap, bring the past to life, and create communities of engaged people who will help keep the stories, and the memory of those who gave their lives, alive for generations to come.

On 11 November, the Commission has also organised a global event called Hold High the Torch. To take part in this, download the free Hold High the Torch app, and pledge to visit a war grave near your home on Armistice Day – Brookwood Military Cemetery is the largest in the UK – and commemorate your local war dead.

CAN YOU HELP WOKING FOODBANK?

SITE VISIT TO SHEETS HEATH

Members of the newsletter team were recently invited to join a group visiting Sheets Heath Common SSSI (Site of Special Scientific Interest) to see the heathland management and restoration work being carried out by the Surrey Heathland Partnership. It was interesting to see and hear the trials and tribulations facing the conservationists, whose aim is to maintain the open areas of mainly heather heathland that is a vital haven for rare wild life.

In the last 10 years warmer winters and atmospheric pollution have resulted in much faster regrowth of gorse, making the heath harder to manage. Gorse isn't hardy and in the past winter frosts kept it in check. Gorse is a legume (like beans and peas) and can fix nitrogen to nodules on its roots, enabling it to live in areas of poor soil quality. Atmospheric pollution from vehicles and power plants has increased the amount of nitrogen released into the air and thus into rain water, and this encourages growth of gorse.

Much more aggressive management is required, therefore, such as the 'biomass harvester' used in February. Chain saws are no longer enough to keep it in check.

The biomass harvester is effective, if brutal, but produces huge quantities of root and plant debris, which has no economic value in the UK and had to be piled up at the edge of the heath.

Cows will eat young gorse but they prefer grass, so grazing helps to reduce the grass which shades the heather but isn't really a solution for the gorse. The cows arrived later than normal this summer due the problems with the automatic gate. As well as keeping the cows in, the gate is important in discouraging vehicles from using the track across the heath as a 'rat run'.

Spraying has been carried out in some places to slow regrowth of bracken but it isn't really effective on gorse. Another enemy of heather is moss, which seals the soil surface, stopping heather seed from germinating.

All this work is carried out according to Natural England guidelines, and is carefully regulated and supervised.

The visit made us appreciate even more the huge amount work that goes into managing this beautiful and important habitat.

NEW YEAR, NEW CHURCH TIMES

From January 2018, Sunday morning services at St Saviour's Church will all start at the new time of 10am. Our Vicar, Neil Hopkins, and a development team hope that this will make it clearer for those wishing to attend, with everyone welcome to join us on a Sunday. There will be a new service called 'Worship at 10', which will begin at 10 and is an informal worship time with praise and prayer, with coffee and pastries available before the service.

Depending which Sunday in the month it is, there is a variety of services:

1st Sunday – Puppet Church (for all ages)

2nd Sunday – Holy Communion Service (time and space to reflect)

3rd Sunday – Café Church (with breakfast, newspapers and chat)

4th Sunday – Worship at 10 (new informal service).

Other services will carry on as before:

3rd Wednesday – 11am Holy Communion (all welcome).
