BASINGSTOKE CANAL

The Basingstoke Canal features regularly in this publication and no apology is made for its inclusion again this month. It is a major asset to the village, beautifully tranquil, enjoyed by many for leisure purposes and even, perhaps, by commuters using the towpath on their way to and from Brookwood Station as part of the daily grind.

And with the changing seasons come different things to enjoy. Whether or not the survival of so many tadpoles is due to changes in fish stock following the time last year when the canal was drained, their numbers suggest that we might soon see a plague of frogs of biblical proportions.

Recently sighted between Riverside Close and Sheets Heath Lane bridge were two cormorants, swimming and diving in almost synchronised fashion. And on a sunny afternoon, fish breaching the surface to take low-flying damselflies was magical. The mess left on the towpath by two adult geese and their six offspring is another matter altogether!

Another sighting, potentially more worrying, is the turtle/terrapin that a local family spotted early in June swimming in the canal at the bottom of their Riverside Close garden. Its shell was about 15cm long. It is either an illegal release or an accidental escape, so if anyone were able to catch it and take it to a local animal rescue centre that would be great.

Unhappily, it's also necessary to report that sometime during May the occupants of a property in Riverside Close, whose garden backs on to the canal, had their small white rowing boat stolen from the end of the garden. This kind of petty theft is very upsetting. Finally, the Basingstoke Canal Society's website has announced, with justifiable pride, that it was selected for The Queen's Award for Voluntary Service recently. This unique UK national honour, equivalent to an MBE, was created by Her Majesty to mark the Golden Jubilee in 2002 and to recognise the outstanding contributions made to local communities by groups of volunteers. The Society will be presented with a glass trophy and certificate signed by Her Majesty in due course. Congratulations to everyone who has contributed to the Canal Society's work and made this prestigious award possible.

TIDYING UP BROOKWOOD

If you go to Connaught Crescent park you may notice a bit of a difference this month. Some of the residents (and a couple of non-residents) took a Sunday morning out in early June and tidied up the road leading to the park. A good amount of rubbish was cleared and lots of weeding done, and it all looks a lot fresher. There's a strong possibility of a repeat for next year with hope of getting into the park itself. Huge thanks to all involved.

On Friday 6 July, Brookwood Cubs will be carrying out a litter pick elsewhere in the village and we express our thanks to them too.

Finally, the appearance of the village would be improved if Surrey County Council repaired the surface of Connaught Road, between the station exit and Connaught Crescent. Their programme for repairing 99 roads in Surrey was announced recently but Connaught Road is not included. It seems that the works completed in the vicinity of the school earlier in the year are all that we are going to get. SCC's website includes information about road repair activity, in the near and distant future, in documents entitled 'Operation Horizon' and 'Horizon 2'. Customer complaints are amongst the criteria used. Mine has been logged and readers are encouraged to do likewise, in the hope that there might at least be the prospect of repairs on the horizon, instead of beyond it.

BROOKWOOD MILITARY CEMETERY – TAKE A GUIDED TOUR

This summer, visitors to the Commonwealth War Graves Commission's largest cemetery in the UK are invited to join a series of tours to discover its history and the incredible stories of those buried there.

The CWGC's experienced volunteer guides will be stationed at the Military Cemetery two to three days a week to share the Cemetery's story. With more than 5,000 Commonwealth war graves and almost 800 war graves of other nationalities, Brookwood Military Cemetery is the final resting place for service personnel from Australia, Canada, India, New Zealand, South Africa, and the UK and Ireland.

The Military Cemetery was established as the First World War drew to a close and then extended for the burial of Second World War service personnel. Brookwood shares many of its architectural and horticultural features with CWGC sites overseas, including the Cross of Sacrifice and Stone of Remembrance. During the tour, the Commission's guides will share the history of the various plots and memorials in the Cemetery, and the stories of some of the brave men and women it commemorates.

There is no need to book for the tours – just turn up. Tours will begin outside the Canadian Records Building, at the main entrance. Tour dates and times for the rest of the summer are:

Every Wednesday and Sunday in July and August, at 2pm
Saturday 7 and 28 July at 11am, 2pm and 3pm
Saturday 14 and 21 July at 11am and 2pm
Saturday 4 and 18 August at 11am, 2pm and 3pm
Saturday 11 and 25 August at 11am and 2pm

COUNCILLOR KEVIN DAVIES REPORTS

The subject of Brookwood Railway Station has been raised at the WBC Overview and Scrutiny Committee with representatives of Network Rail and South Western Railway, in particular disabled access, access for people with pushchairs, flooding and motorcycle bays.

Woking is the only mobility friendly station in the Borough. With Brookwood, the advice is that travellers who need to travel from the inaccessible platform 2 should travel to Woking, use the lift and return; or when coming back from the London direction, travel to Farnborough, use the lift and return. Obviously this makes a journey significantly longer and is totally unacceptable in this day and age. Cllr Kevin is expecting to meet with the Regional Development Manager in the near future to discuss the problems.

Nothing obvious has progressed on Brookwood Lye housing other than to try and secure the site further. Cllr Kevin is not happy about the gradual spread of the Travellers and has made representations to enforcement.

Following the roadshow at the start of the year, residents' views have been put into the mix and other areas have been looked at in more detail, including a more detailed Flood Risk Assessment; the improvements to Brookwood Crossroads have now been directly linked to the development and a slight redesign made to the brutal, flatted buildings to make them blend in better with the surrounding properties. The changes will be resubmitted soon and once validated as an acceptable application, the clock will start ticking again and the statutory consultation will begin. Essentially, the process is working as it should although it is frustrating that it can be so slow.

BROOKWOOD CEMETERY

You might have noticed recently, either when walking around the Cemetery or from looking from the train on the approach to Brookwood Station, that workmen have been tidying up some of the trees. Avril Kirby, Brookwood Cemetery Manager, advises that a Tree Protection Order covers the whole of the Cemetery. Following an inspection survey carried out at the end of last year, approximately 25 dead, dying or dangerous trees were identified for removal after discussions with Woking Borough Council's Tree Officer. A full tree survey of the site will be carried out later this year to identify any further necessary works and thereafter the Cemetery's management will be working with the Council Tree Officer to arrange a tree-planting programme to conserve the long-term historical interest of the site. Given the rate of growth of specimen trees, some of us most certainly will not see the new trees at anything like their best. However, having enjoyed the trees planted by the Cemetery's earlier owners, it's nice to think that future generations will look back and praise those now concerned in this initiative for their forward thinking.

YOUNG AND OLD ARE WINNERS AT PIRBRIGHT VILLAGE DUCK FAIR

The Pirbright Village Duck Fair and Flower Festival on 16 June was a huge success. The rain held off, the fairground organ boomed out, the smell of fresh flowers filled the church, and the aroma of sizzling sausages filled the village green.
