

What a year it has been for Brookwood Beavers. At Christmas we swam Jason up the 'river' to join the leadership team in Cubs, along with Nick as an Assistant Beaver leader to join Flo and Seren and our fabulous young leaders: Laura, Byron and Nathan, who have been a massive support during the last year. This term we are also welcoming Charlotte to the leadership team but there is always room for more...

Our colony has grown from strength to strength, ending the term with 22 Beavers. Seven are due to swim up to Cubs and there is a waiting list of 16 Beavers who are eligible for an immediate start. We have had visits from the Beavers' pets, undertaken team challenges and worked on our disability awareness, when Beavers had a chance to experience some of the challenges faced by people living with a disability. As a colony we have also been well represented at District events with good attendance at the Remembrance Day Parade at Brookwood Cemetery, the St George's Day Parade at Woking Football Club, Science Day

and Bazzaz. Bazzaz involved thousands of Beavers from over Surrey enjoying a day of hundreds of activities at Merrist Wood. Over 200 badges have been awarded this year to Beavers who have demonstrated a vast range of skills, including nine bronze awards, which is the highest award that can be achieved at Beavers. It's hard work but worth every minute, especially when a beaver shouts 'best session EVER!' at the end of the session.

orienteeing whilst the weather was still good, increasing the pack's knowledge of first aid, a visit from some reptiles plus creepy-crawlies, and honouring Remembrance Day. The term finished with carol singing at Brookwood Station. In the spring, new Sixers and Seconders were chosen, who have grown into the roles over the last couple of months. Our programme focused on events including Burns Night, Chinese New Year, bowling plus Chocolate Bingo nights, Quiz and catapult building. This summer we had outdoor skills with campfire cooking, tent-building, and a guest session on air activities, where Cubs learned about physics and built their own planes. There was also a Skills Challenge evening and a village litter pick. Over 150 badges have been awarded during the year and nine of our older Cubs took part in the District Back to Basics Camp. They had to put up their own tents (officially inspected!), take part in survival skill activities, including gutting and cooking fish, building and lighting fires, archery, pioneering, branding, performing a skit, sleeping under canvas and a hike. All survived and went home no doubt tired but full of exciting new experiences. This autumn the Cubs are eagerly anticipating our first whole pack camp for several years. This term, our leaders, Neil, Jason, Nick, Pete and Mark, will also be joined by Kayley.

SCOUT TROOP (girls and boys aged 10–14)

The Scout Troop numbers were down from 29 to 24 due to 11 Scouts passing the leaving age, six of whom are now in the Challengers Explorer Unit. We fielded teams in the Esher District Night Hike, Woking District Night Hike, District Lightweight Expedition, County Cyclocross, and secured second place in the District Rifle Shooting. The highlight of the year was beating off stiff competition to win the County Lightweight Expedition. Many congratulations are due to the team for becoming county champions, but everyone who has camped or hiked has played a part in this success and given the Troop the experience to make a challenge possible. During our Friday evening meetings the Troop has continued to develop traditional scouting skills including cycling, wide games, fire lighting, night hikes, incident evenings, pantomime, rifle shooting, bowling, survival and environmental work at Fox Corner. Two of our former Scouts have been selected to attend the World Jamboree 2019 in the USA. The camping programme has been substantial with Scoutabout, (thousands of Scouts gather from all over Surrey for a weekend at the South of England Showground doing hundreds of

activities), District Canoe Camp, May Camp and Half Term Camp. Summer Camp is planned for early September. Our leaders, Huckle, Pete, Simon, Mark and Ahsan, will be welcoming Stephen to the team from September.

They are not a charity and collect unwanted stock from charity shops as well. Better quality clothes are sent to Africa, warmer items to Eastern Europe, and the rest gets sold on for cleaning cloths, mattress and sofa filling. I spoke to a representative and he pointed out that this means there is zero landfill. It is useful to know the background of the company so that you can make an informed choice about where you take your unwanted items.
