FLYING VISIT

The world famous steam train, the Flying Scotsman, paid a flying visit to Brookwood on Friday 12 April on one of its few journeys around the south this year. It felt as though most of the village and surrounding area had filled both platforms to watch as it went through the station. It was a magnificent sight, watching this 96-year-old engine steam into the station and beyond. It was adorned with a small selection of flowers on the front and the sun gave it an extra special shine! It had been scheduled to stop at Brookwood for approximately ten minutes to re-fill with water, but they called ahead to say that they had enough water and so wouldn't be stopping. Whilst a disappointment for some, it didn't affect the enthusiasm of most of the crowd.

The locomotive was built in Doncaster in 1923 for the newly formed London and North Eastern Railway (LNER). In 1924, it became famous when it appeared at the British Empire Exhibition in London, named 'Flying Scotsman' after the London to Edinburgh rail service. It was given a new type of tender in 1928, with a corridor, which meant that a new crew could take over without stopping the train. This allowed it to haul the first ever non-stop London to Edinburgh service, reducing the journey time to eight hours. In 1934, Scotsman was clocked at 100mph on a special test run – officially the first locomotive in the UK to have reached that speed.



- On Saturday 11 May, St Saviour's Church will welcome back local band Stormy Waters for a great night of live music, supported by Billy Liberator AKA Paul Huggett, who is also from Brookwood. St Saviour's is rapidly gaining a reputation as a venue for the performing arts, having recently seen gigs featuring comedian Paul Kerensa, Tony Vino, Siobhan Owen and Mary Jess, among others. That reputation has been well earned, as the church building is an excellent venue with stunning acoustics enabling hosting anything from a rock band to a string quartet. All who perform comment on the great sound and warm atmosphere of the venue.
- Use of the church building in this way could be seen as contentious, after all, what is a rock band doing in the parish church? In the Church of England, it is accepted that a church building can have a variety of uses. Those uses need not be ecclesiastical in purpose provided the primary use of the church remains that of worship. In the last 50 years, faith groups have started recognising their building as a practical asset in building a relationship with the local community who may not come into the building for worship, especially where the church may be the only public building left after the school, the pub, the shop and post office have gone. In exactly the same



way as Brookwood Bakery now hosts the Post Office, churches can deliver vital public services such as libraries, meeting facilities and entertainment. For the place of worship, this is a way of reconnecting with the local community – St Saviour's is after all there for the people of Brookwood.

The Evening Standard sums up the entertainment scene in venues such as St Saviour's like this: *'London is packed with incredible places to watch live music, from world-famous arenas to sweaty basement bars. But one type of venue provides a gig experience like nothing else: a church.'*

So come on down on Saturday 11 May to catch Stormy Waters and Billy Liberator present the 'Brookwood Sessions' in our local church right at the heart of our community.
