

1. The Anglo-Saxons called January "Wulfmonath" as it was the month hungry wolves came scavenging at people's doors.
2. The Romans named it January after Janus, the God of gateways.
3. Janus had two heads so he could look in both directions, back at the old year and forward towards the new year, at the same time.
4. According to the International Standard Organisation's ISO 8601, week 1 of any year is the week including January 4.
5. Daytime temperatures in January make it the coldest month of the year in the UK. February nights are colder in England (but not Scotland).
6. The only Shakespeare plays that mention January are Much Ado About Nothin and Winter's Tale.
7. The birthstone for January is the garnet; the flower is the carnation.
8. The first recorded reference to a "January sale" in the UK was in 1865.
9. There is a variety of cold-tolerant winter cabbage grown in England known as January King.
10. There are 31 days, 744 hours, 44,640 minutes and 2,678,400 seconds in January.

CHILDREN'S BOOK RAISES MONEY FOR LOCAL BEAUTY SPOT

Skip's Waterway is a new adventure story written by a local Mum to help raise money for the Basingstoke Canal. The story follows the adventures of two children aboard "Baisey" the talking narrowboat, as they try to save the canal from closure by navigating all the way to the end at Basingstoke. Along the way they discover the waterway's natural wonders and learn all about its impressive engineering.

The author of the book is Jenny Pateman, a volunteer on the canal and Odiham mum of two. She was inspired to write the story after reading about the last attempted full navigation of the canal, which took place in 1913. A donation from book sales goes to the Basingstoke Canal Society to help preserve the canal for future generations.

Jenny said: "I'd just like to say a huge thank you to everyone who has supported the project so far. It's been great fun for me and I hope your little ones enjoy it too. My hope is that the book will help raise the profile of our beautiful waterway among the younger generations – encouraging more visitors to come and raising some much needed funds."
