KEEPING THE BASINGSTOKE CANAL ALIVE

A recent edition of the Basingstoke Canal Society's Bulletin reports on the challenges currently facing the management of the canal, 50 years on from the time when, through an extraordinary and united effort, the community, County Councils and hundreds of volunteers stepped up to the challenge and successfully restored the canal, reopening it in 1991.

Unfortunately, it is no exaggeration to say that the Society faces a challenge on a similar scale now. On the surface, the canal may appear as serene and beautiful as ever – the County Council staff do a fantastic job with support from volunteers – but years of

austerity have cut funding to the bone and the Society's view is that it can't go on like this much longer.

If the canal is to be kept alive, the Society believes that it is now crucial for the community, businesses and the Canal Society to play a greater role. With this in mind, "Keeping the Canal Alive" has been launched. This is an initiative with four defined objectives, namely

- promoting the future of the canal;
- protecting our environment;
- providing community leisure activities;

- preserving our heritage.

The strategy is to raise funds and then, working closely with the Councils, to progress various projects which will improve the canal for the community and all users.


SHEETS HEATH

As can be seen from the picture provided by John Thornton, conservation work is now under way on Sheets Heath, planned for completion by the end of February. No doubt keeping the bonfires going during the recent extremely wet weather will be a challenge!

By way of background information, the Surrey heathland project was set up to restore, enhance and manage heathlands across the county. It is funded by Surrey County Council and three other partners, one of which is Woking Borough Council. Together they form the Surrey Heathland Partnership, which has been looking after beautiful lowland heathland sites for over 25 years.

Lowland heathland is an open landscape generally covered in heathers, gorse and tree scrub. It can also include bracken, acid grassland, bogs, bare sandy or peaty ground, scattered trees and water. Two hundred years ago heathland covered most of West Surrey but now less than a fifth of this original heathland remains. It's been mainly lost due to urban development, unmanaged forestry encroachment and general neglect. Lowland heathland is an internationally rare and unique habitat, supporting a variety of specialised plants and wildlife.

In Surrey 85% of the heathland has been lost in just 200 years, leading to a severe loss of biodiversity. In recent decades heathland has been recognised for its wildlife value and its historical and cultural interest, and much is now protected from development. In Woking the areas under management are Brookwood Heath, Prey Heath, Sheet's Heath and Smart's Heath. The project involves organised grazing and clearance of invasive scrub and bracken, as well as promoting an understanding of heathland and encouraging good management practice. This is essential to supporting the



rare species that need heathland in order to survive.

Although the number of characteristic heathland species is small, our heathland supports internationally important numbers of three ground-nesting bird species – the nightjar, woodlark and Dartford warbler. Lowland

heathland is extremely important too for invertebrates, especially insects and spiders, and many rare and characteristic species occur. Surrey is one of only three counties in the British Isles which support all of the native heathland reptiles and amphibians, including the rare and specially protected sand lizard, smooth snake and natterjack toad.

Brookwood Memorial Halls continues to improve its facilities, now having replaced the unreliable auto door opener on the main hall with a commercial standard one. The doors had to be changed also to meet current disabled access requirements, so now double buggies can pass freely through.

Managed by local unpaid volunteers, the

halls are kept to a high standard, complying with Charity Commission requirements and safety standards. Both halls host a wide range of activities – dance, badminton, yoga, Pilates, toddlers, youth groups, U3A activities, Women's Institute, whist, etc. and are available for social hires at good rates, discounted for residents.
