## TRAFFIC ON CONNAUGHT ROAD



There is a mandatory speed limit of 30 mph evidenced by signage on all approaches to the village. Even with warning signs indicating road humps for  $\frac{3}{4}$  of a mile, a 'school' sign and a red 'WATCH YOUR SPEED' sign along the road, it appears that very few motorists observe the speed limit. There have been near misses by the Brookwood Primary School thereby endangering our young people and their parents. This has all been brought to the attention of our local village councillor, Kevin Davis, and he has informed Brookwood News that one of his fellow councillors, Councillor Azad, has sufficient budget and has asked officers to allocate it to Connaught Road for an electronic speed warning sign to further reinforce the mandatory speed limit. Kevin has asked me to ask the Brookwood residents for suggestions as to where they would want the electronic warning sign to be positioned. # BROOKWOOD PRIMARY SCHOOL REOPENS

It was with great pleasure to open the doors to all children and welcome them back to school. The children have settled very quickly and the school is looking fantastic after lots of work over the summer. From new electrics to a brand new reception classroom, a huge amount of work has been completed, and I want to thank our School Business Manager and Caretaker for leading the projects so smoothly.

Despite school closure, spirits remained high throughout the summer and children worked very hard both at home and in school. Using a brand new home-learning smart phone app 'Seesaw', the teachers were able to set work and provide feedback for children. Assemblies became virtual and each week had an overarching theme – my favourite was 'The Great Brookwood Bake Off Week!' We plan to continue to use Seesaw to communicate learning to parents at home throughout this academic year.



Staff and children are adapting to the new-normal back at school with children remaining in bubbles, starting and finishing at slightly different times, and having breaks and lunch at staggered times. The playground and field have been split into sections and there are very strict timings to follow but so far so good!

On behalf of the school, I would like to extend my thanks to all parents and carers who have been very understanding and appreciative of the changes. Our aim has been to provide more opportunities for parents to come into school and build relationships, and we are now reluctantly restricting access for parents and ensuring they are social distancing and dropping off and collecting children promptly.

I am looking forward to working with the community this year to make sure we keep the children safe, happy and give them the first class education that they deserve.

### REPOSE OF MOTHER VIKENTIA

On Sunday, 3 / 16 August, Mother Vikentia, the superior of the Convent of the Annunciation, Brondesbury Park, Willesden, reposed in the Lord after a long period of illness and debility. It was the day after the year's mind of Abbess Seraphima, the previous superior. Fr Nicolae Capitanu tended to Mother Vikentia's spiritual needs during her last days on earth. On her ninth day, Monday, 11 / 24 August, after the celebration of the Divine Liturgy at the Convent, the monastic funeral service was chanted. His Grace, Bishop Ambrose of Methoni, was the protocelebrant and he was assisted by Fr Nicolae and Hieromonk Sabbas. The services were chanted mostly in English, Romanian and Greek, with some Slavonic and a little Arabic. Mother Vikentia was then laid to rest with her Amma, Abbess Elisabeth, in Gunnersbury Cemetery. May she be granted abundant mercies and blessings for her long service in the monastic life, for her ministry as the Convent's superior for nearly two decades, and for the love and care that she showed to others. We ask all the faithful to remember

her in their prayers and to give alms in her memory. May her rest be with the Saints and her Memory Eternal!

### ADULT BAPTISM AT SAINT EDWARD'S

On the Great Feast of the Transfiguration of our Saviour, Wednesday, 6 / 19 August, the catechumen Gregory Ferguson was baptised at Saint Edward's Church before the celebration of the festal Divine Liturgy. Gregory, who is named after Saint Gregory the Great, the Pope of Rome, was made a catechumen on the feast of the Saviour's Nativity, 2018, and we had hoped to baptise him earlier this year, but the pandemic and personal situations meant this was postponed. The mysterion was celebrated by Fr Borislav Popov, who, at the end, gave an extensive exhortation to the newly-illuminated, and Anthony Bell has taken on the responsibility of being Gregory's godfather. Gregory's parents, Nicol and Deirdre, attended the mysterion and the Divine Liturgy. May Gregory contest well through the remainder of his life and win the prize of his high calling.

### KEOTCoLtd AGM

The Annual General Meeting of the charity which administers our property at Brookwood, the King Edward Orthodox Trust Co Ltd, registered charity number 284929, was held later this year because of the government regulations about the covid pandemic. Usually it is held at the beginning of July, but this year we met on Sunday, 9 August and, rather than being in the exhibition room as previously, we held it in the church where members could

better socially isolate. The chairman's report and the treasurer's report were approved, and we thank Elena Matthews for the excellent work she did in preparing the accounts. The directors were re-elected, and Fr Thomas was invited to become a member of the company. It was also decided that we would raise the cost of grave reservations to £4,000 for a single-depth grave and £5,000 for a double-depth grave.

### LIGGY CAMP

Between 7 and 17 August, it proved possible for the Liggly Camp to be held at Earsham, Suffolk, although of course under conditions somewhat restricted by the government guidelines, thus this year there were no participants from abroad. The temporary chapel there is dedicated to Saint Olaf, the King of Norway, and on his feast day, Tuesday 29 July / 11 August, which was also the nameday of Archbishop Kallinikos, the president of our Synod of Bishops, Fr Borislav Popov celebrated the Divine Liturgy for the participants. Brookwood parishioners, Anthony and Procla Bell, attended to lead the chanting during daily services.

### BURIAL AT SAINT EDWARD'S

Wednesday, 5 August: Liudmila Samoiloova of Erith, Kent, was laid to rest in Saint Edward Cemetery. The funeral was led by Archpriest Maxim Nikolsky and Archpriest Joseph Skinner of the Russian Orthodox Cathedral of the Dormition of the Mother of God and of All Saints, Knightsbridge, London. May the handmaid of God Liudmila find rest with the saints. Memory Eternal!

## CUT YOUR MASK STRAPS WHEN YOU'VE FINISHED WITH YOUR DISPOSABLE MASK

## CHARITY LITTER PICKING

Lynda Shore, a previous resident of West Hill Close back in the 1970s/1980s, has started a charity litter pick in and around St Johns (where she lives) as well as Knaphill and Brookwood. She has been collecting for Christian Aid for almost 50 years, and has spent the last 39 years organising the local Christian Aid Week collection throughout Knaphill. Each year Lynda and her daughter Rachel have raised on average £2,000 from their collection week, which they then donate to Christian Aid to support their charitable projects.

Due to Covid-19 and the lockdown restrictions, it has not been possible for their local collection to take place this year and Lynda has been looking for a socially distanced way that she could do her bit instead.

Lynda has therefore decided to undertake a sponsored litter pick in the Knaphill and St John's areas of Woking, near to where she lives. She intends to spend at least 20 hours over the course of September, come rain or shine, tidying up our streets, and has set herself a target of £500.
