WELLIE WALKING

Yvonne and Mark Craven have been making the best of lockdown by going walking, and Yvonne has kindly sent this article to us.

Over the past few months, many of us have appreciated, if we didn't before, how lucky we are to live within walking distance of heathland, woods, fields and the canal towpath. Judging by the numbers of people out and about, many more have discovered the joy of wandering paths and exercising in the great outdoors, where no two days are the same in terms of weather, what you see and who you meet. My elderly mother was living with us during the first and second lockdowns, and we regularly strolled to Sheets Heath Bridge and the towpath for her slower form of exercise. She would laugh because we always stopped to talk to someone I knew, which is one of the reasons I love living here.

Since those dusty summer walks, the narrow paths on the heath have turned into motorways of mud, and Mark and I don't leave the house without our 20-year-old wellingtons. In fact, we've almost worn them out now, discovering that they are surprisingly comfortable with thick socks. Up until now, they were mainly used in the garden in the winter. We've covered several miles at a time, walking out to West Heath and Mill Lane, or down to Fox Corner across Brookwood and Pirbright Heath.



Oh, the thrill and confidence of wading through puddles or squelching across quagmires. It takes me back to toddler days, where there were no worries about filling your boots or muddying your trousers, because someone else was doing the washing. We've discovered new paths that we didn't know existed, sometimes venturing off the beaten track to find hidden streams or different routes, even getting lost on the ranges on one occasion. Google maps doesn't tell all!

When life returns to near normal, I wonder whether we will keep up our regular communion with nature, or become too busy again. Only time will tell. Meanwhile the Christmas voucher is going towards a new pair of wellies.

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COBLANDS SITE

Councillor Kevin Davis has kindly provided an update on the situation with the old Coblands site on Brookwood Lye Road.

He says: "This is still bogged down in the planning process and I'm still wary of giving any dates as to when things may change. The site is in the Green Belt. To us in Brookwood it's brown field, but to the Local Planning Authority (LPA) the land cannot be built on without special circumstances, and the owner of the site, Thameswey (a WBC housing company), has not been able to convince the LPA to let it develop the site.

"The LPA has doggedly resisted developing here; their view is that if they were to grant building there then it would potentially open the flood gates to other land owners who are itching to develop in the Green Belt. That means the correct process needs to be followed. The most recent consultation by a Government appointed inspector ended just before Christmas and I don't see any reason why the inspector won't recommend the site comes out of the Green Belt. The land is due to come out of the Green Belt in 2022, so I am confident that by attrition, the LPA will get its way and delay any development until then at the earliest.

"Personally, having seen my children forced to leave the borough due to a lack of housing, it's a failure that the young adults in Brookwood who wish to stay in Brookwood have been denied that opportunity over the past decade due to planning rules created in the 1950s that need reform. On the plus side, over half the dwellings will be affordable, and there will be a policy on those dwellings that at

least gives people with a clear connection to Brookwood a shot at living there when a dwelling becomes available.

"The Traveller site also needs regularising and a planning application was submitted in 2017 to do just that. That application is still pending as it has been an impossible task to try and get the senior officers (non-elected) of the Council to focus on this site. We had an elected leadership change last October and the new leader Councillor Azad is as keen to see this site developed as I am, and as soon as possible. In November her words to me were 'Watch this space'. Councillor Azad is also one of the Councillors for Brookwood so there is a good chance something will happen over the course of the next 18 months. She and I visited the site immediately after the first lockdown over the summer, and I gave her chapter and verse on the situation and history.

"This leads me to the rubbish being dumped there. Simply put, there is no point in clearing the fly-tipped waste until development starts as it will just attract new fly-tipped waste and the costs to dispose of it will be racked up again. It's an eyesore certainly, but Environmental Health do keep an eye on it and, if there were concerns, they would force Thameswey to clear it.

"Basically, we need to be patient, the Traveller site will be regularised, the waste will be disposed of, the housing will be built, and the road and crossroads will be modified to ease network pressure. We might get some progress later this year, we certainly will over the next two."

ELLACOMBE CHIMES

When St Michael and All Angels church in Pirbright closed in March 2020, so did the bells, with no ringers allowed in the tower. By the end of July, when the first post-lockdown wedding was allowed to take place, it had been the bells' longest silence since World War 2. But what is a wedding without bells? And you can't have bells without ringers.

Then someone remembered the old Ellacombe chimes, which fell out of use in the 1950s or 60s, but which allow one person to chime all six bells. The chimes were in a mess, the ropes were missing or broken, the hammers had seized up and one was missing completely. But

perhaps they could be rescued? A small team set to work, freeing and securing the hammers; locating and replacing the missing one; replacing around 78 metres of rope; and cleaning and repairing the 'business end' in the ringing chamber. But would they work?

The sound doesn't carry like the full bells, so you will have to listen hard for them, but the chimes sounded lovely for two weddings in the summer, for Christmas and New Year. At least they are keeping the sound of the church bells alive until the ringers are allowed back into the ringing chamber. Then, what a glorious sound there will be!



If you love documentaries and lectures on 'arts' subjects then you might want to think about joining The Arts Society Woking. 

BROOKWOOD CEMETERY



Brookwood Cemetery has received £30,000 towards the ongoing restoration of the Columbarium, which, until acquired by the council, had been blocked up and closed off to the public due to its condition. The funding comes from the government's Culture Recovery Fund to help meet the cost of repairs during the coronavirus pandemic.

The Columbarium is the largest and most notable of its kind within the cemetery and is a listed monument in its own right. The cruciform, stone-built structure is defined by its central dome and elegant classical features. Inside the Columbarium there is a gallery at entrance level and, towards the back, an internal staircase leading to an underground vault.

Councillor Graham Cundy, Woking Borough Council's Lead Member for Brookwood Cemetery, said: "This grant from the government's recovery fund will help us to get our repair programme back on schedule, which has been severely hampered by the virus. With the winter months now upon us, we need to make urgent repairs to the roof of the Columbarium to prevent any further water damage.

"Prior to the pandemic, the council approved an ambitious and exciting set of plans to safeguard the future of the cemetery and encourage greater use of this diverse site. The Columbarium is one of the larger public monuments in the cemetery with an interesting history, which should be more accessible to our residents."
