EDITORIAL





CANAL SPRING NEWS SUMMARY

The Basingstoke Canal Society has been delighted at the 20 per cent increase in members since last year's plea for help. Fundraising is ongoing and there are plans to build stronger links with councils across the area. A new website has been launched and funds found for continuing maintenance. A current project is installing new signboards about wildlife and the history of the canal.

"We are tremendously grateful for everyone's very generous donations," said Society Co-

vice-chairman Ken Sankey. "We believe more people could enjoy the physical and mental health benefits to be gained and an aim for this year is to develop ways to reach more members of our population."

KNAPHILL, ST JOHNS & BROOKWOOD VOLUNTEER GROUP

Over the past year, a diligent group of volunteers has been tirelessly helping elderly and vulnerable local residents with shopping, collecting prescriptions and making regular phone calls to those isolated or lonely. Sonal Sher set up the group in March 2020, at the beginning of the first lockdown, and leaflets were distributed in Knaphill, St John's and Brookwood offering help and support. Since then, the group has grown to over 200 volunteers, assisting hundreds of families in Woking: over 1000 errands, over 650 care calls plus fundraising initiatives and donations to CSH Surrey, one of the local schools, York Road Homeless shelter and Your Sanctuary. In addition cards and letters to neighbours were sent during the summer to help with isolation, and a lockdown library was set up. The group has established good links with Woking Borough Council and other voluntary organisations, so that if a volunteer comes across someone who needs additional support, they can alert professionals.


RUNNING NEWS

be it 20 or 55 minutes. In its place 'Brookwood Park Run', a slightly more socially distanced, but more picturesque version, was born. My 5km route begins at Sheet's Heath Bridge, goes along the towpath to Pirbright Bridge, right along the road, then right again onto Sheet's Heath, up to the houses for a quick lap before returning on the same route (see map). CLLR KEVIN DAVIS UPDATE

At the Planning Committee held on Monday 22 February, the application to regularise the Traveller site at Five Acres came through with a recommendation to approve. Last month, I wrote at length about the whole Coblands site and how I was hoping to see progress with the Traveller site, the fly-tipped waste, the new housing and the infrastructure changes to the crossroads. The Traveller site is the first part of the jigsaw and, although I'm not a member of the Planning Committee, the Chairman graciously allowed me to speak. I spoke in support of the application tonight, but also raised my concerns around the illegal pitches that have popped up there. Regularising this site will enable the Local Planning Authority to take action to remove illegal pitches and I will be pushing hard for that. I'm pleased to say that the application was granted. We won't see changes overnight but progress is finally being made.

HEATH CLEARANCE

If you have included Sheets Heath as part of your daily walks recently, you may have noticed piles of holly over the heath and many areas being cleared. It is quite alarming to see so much being cut down, so when we saw a friendly workman a couple of weeks ago, we asked the reason. The work is being carried out by Woking Council as part of the programme for heathlands preservation, to encourage heather and all the wildlife and ecosystems that go with that, including ground-nesting birds such as Dartford warbler, woodlark and nightjar. Holly is an invasive species, and heather and gorse are being preserved. Thames Basin Heaths Partnership is another organisation that is also managing heathland across Surrey. We can help by keeping to footpaths, learning how to avoid starting fires, and keeping dogs out of vegetation, especially between the months of March and September.



JUST GET MOVING!

As the weather gets warmer, FOBS, Friends of Brookwood School, have been putting their thinking hats on. We have decided to 'just get moving'! This will be more than just a school event, as family, friends and the community can get involved. On Friday 23 April, we will be encouraging all children in school to get moving and run 2km. During 24-25 April, we are inviting friends, family and members of the local community to 'just get moving' with us, and see how far we can run, walk or cycle over the weekend. Route, speed and timings are all down to you. We simply ask that you email us with your distance travelled and we will then see how far we can go if we 'just get moving'!

STRUGGLING TO KEEP WARM?

Are you worried by debt to your current Gas or Electricity supplier?



.....We may be able to help pay some of it and turn your home from cold to cosy.

Project Wenceslas was set up by Woking Lions Club to help the people of Woking and surrounding villages who may be struggling to pay their fuel bills and have possibly built up debt to their energy supplier.

Money is collected from people who are awarded the Government's Winter Fuel Allowance but who choose to donate it to those in Fuel Poverty. It is administered through Citizens Advice Woking. Small grants are available to individuals who make an application and who meet certain criteria.
