As a result of these storms, over 60 trees came down and blocked the Navigation and towpath of the Basingstoke Canal over the weekend of 19–20 February. The advice was to avoid using the towpath, and car parks remained closed because of the on-going high winds and the need to clear

up fallen debris. Two sections of towpath at Frimley Lodge Park and Deepcut cutting were completely closed for safety reasons due to large hung-up trees. The Navigation was littered with debris, fallen trees and branches, and is best avoided both for powered and unpowered boats.





THE STORY OF A LION

This year celebrates 100 years of broadcasting by the BBC, which started in 1922 as a radio station, call sign 2LO, sending out regular news bulletins. In December, Lord Reith was appointed and he developed broadcasting to further genres of programming and founded the ethos that the BBC follows to this day. When I was 18, I started my working life at the BBC and I know that there are others living in the village who have made their careers in broadcasting. On my shelf, I have a BBC handbook published in 1931; I was flicking through it the other day and came across this extraordinary story about the lengths that broadcasters would go to in order to get a sound effect. Remember that recording equipment was not portable then. This is the story of Poilu, the lion who nearly broadcast.

Poilu was the pride of a menagerie in Kent, and the demand for his services as a broadcaster came about when an Empire Day programme was under consideration. Someone suggested that the Imperial spirit would be suitably symbolised by the roaring of a lion. They must have a genuine lion, no gramophone record or roaring synthetically produced by "Effects" would suffice. The owner of Poilu said that he felt certain that he could be made to growl, but not to roar, as lions only roar when the mood takes them. Despite this, arrangements were made to move him to the studio in a caged wagon. All seemed set for the lion's microphone debut, when the BBC wrote to the owner... 'I take it that it will be possible to get the lion upstairs to the studio, as it cannot be more difficult to move him, than to move a grand piano!' However, it was decided to install Poilu in the yard and let him growl (or roar) from there. Alas, poor Poilu, his hopes of fame were dashed when a telegraphist from London tapped out the fearful words, "please cancel all arrangements in connection with lion." What were the reasons? Perhaps the BBC was afraid that Poilu would eat an announcer and awkward questions would be asked in the House.

CEMETERY STORIES – BROCK BULLET

In reference to your editorial, several years ago, I stumbled upon a memorial to Frank Arthur Brock, the founder of the incendiary bullet used for shooting down German airships, known as the Brock bullet. It seems he was sadly lost at the raid of Zeebrugge, where he was involved with screening the attack with artificial fog. A pioneering war hero. Brock was a member of the Admiralty Board of Invention and Research, and founded, organised and commanded the Royal Navy Experimental Station at Stratford. I found it intriguing that such a man and his story is tucked away in an overgrown part of the cemetery. It makes you wonder what other nuggets of history are there to find.
